

Congratulations to our Year 12 students for making it through to an important life milestone; a culmination of thirteen years of schooling. My sincerest hope is that you achieve what you have set out to achieve and your results positively reflect your effort. As Year 12 Year Advisor, the close bond he created with this cohort of students was very special. The affection, as a year group, that Year 12 have for Michael was palpable at their final assembly.

Every fortnight, I meet with the school student leadership team for lunch. The purpose of these meetings is to work together to determine future directions, identify school improvement projects, and to engage in leadership opportunities. At our last meeting, the student leaders identified the student toilets as an area that required some work. Unfortunately, a small minority of students take pleasure in vandalising or leaving the toilets in a mess. This impacts on all students. In response to the misuse of these facilities, the school executive has decided to use tighter measures to control toilet traffic. Should students wish to use the toilets during class, they will need to gain permission and a note from their teacher to go to the front office, whereby, they will be given a key and directed to the appropriate toilet for their use. This way we can keep track of who uses the toilets and when they are being used. Please note that this arrangement is common practice in many other schools and does not preclude students from going to the toilet during class time.



A dedicated and hardworking team of teachers are currently working on the school's discipline policy. This revamp will be due to be actioned from the commencement of 2018. I am excited by the development of this policy as it promises to bring greater consistency in the way classroom disciplinary matters are handled.

Science Week Challenge

- a musical instrument challenge (students had to use the provided equipment to create a musical instrument with the loudest sound).



My name is Mihkaila Sansom, I am a Year 11 student at Coomealla High School.





During the Termm 3 holidays, I walked in the footsteps of the brave along the Kokoda Track with the Australian Army Cadets, Victorian Brigade with No Roads Expeditions.

We flew into Port Moresby, then on to Popondetta to then stagger from the PMV in Kokoda, having 'enjoyed' a three-hour dust-cloud in the back of the PMV also known as the chiropractic express. Finally, we had arrived. It was a relief to put the pack on and get moving towards Deniki.

Collapsing into Deniki, my legs were quivering and heart pounding, that's where we all started wondering how our training back in Australia related to the conditions in PNG. The heat and humidity causing gasping lungs and rivers of sweat. Would anyone make it to the top, let alone complete the trek days later?

Day Two would reassure us all, with the 'flat ground' between Deniki and Alola giving our group an opportunity to get our 'trek legs'. Lunch and service at Isurava was a highlight. The climb down from Kagi would claim a friend.



Making fun of the Australian guide- we all weren't happy with the answer of "20 minutes" or the description of "flat ground", EVEN when it was 20 minutes and flat ground.

Ower's Corner- tears are a sign of great strength, of overcoming a life-changing challenge and achieving something truly great.






Ronald Jackson 1951 - 2017

The school was saddened recently by the passing of Ron Jackson.

Ron was a long-standing member on the staff of Coomealla High, retiring in 2015. He served with distinction as the school's Aboriginal Education Officer and was employed in the Department of Education for 28 years. Ron was dedicated to his role as the AEO and devoted himself to enhancing the education of both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students.

Ron was a man of many talents, he was a keen fisherman, loved to travel and was a published author. His book "Firewood & Rabbits" includes cultural information, lesson notes and blackline masters which teachers continue to use to enhance their students cultural knowledge and awareness.





Ron was a devoted family man. He loved his family and they were everything to him. He would often share stories of his children's achievements and was devoted to his grandchildren. Ron was always quick with a story, a joke or an affectionate hug. His easy-going demeanour endeared him to all who knew him. He will be sadly missed by the Coomealla School community.

Ron wrote this book which was first published in 2007 which recalls stories from his youth about firewood and rabbits in and around Lake Mungo and the Murray River.


