Dear Parents and Carers

Coomealla High School will transition to the new NSW Public Schools' finance system and a new bank account on Monday the 24th of July 2017.

To ensure a smooth transition, there will be changes to the way we accept payments from parents and carers.

Direct deposits: As of the **Friday the 30**th **of June 2017**, we will no longer accept direct deposits into our current school bank account as we prepare to close this account and transition to the new one. Any payments made using direct deposit after this date cannot be properly allocated to a student's account in a timely manner. Please ensure you have made any outstanding direct deposits before **Friday the 30**th **of June 2017**.

EFTPOS payments: We will not be able to accept EFTPOS payments between Wednesday the 19th of July 2017 and Monday the 24th of July 2017. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding EFTPOS payments before Wednesday the 19th of July 2017. From Tuesday the 25th of July 2017, EFTPOS payments will be accepted as before.

Cash and cheque payments: Between Wednesday the 19th of July 2017 and Monday the 24th of July 2017, we will also not be able to accept payments by cash or cheque as we prepare to close our current bank account and transition to the new one. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding cash or cheque payments before Wednesday the 19th of July 2017. From Tuesday the 25th of July 2017, cash, and cheque payments will be accepted as before.

Year Eleven/Twelve have helped with some tractor and fencing work as well as doing plant trials on the farm and in the laboratory.






Finally, the last of our pigs is looking for a home. We will be fixing up the pens and then getting some replacement pigs in Term Three.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data

School Students with Disability



Information for parents and carers

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is an annual collection that counts the number of school students receiving an adjustment due to disability and the level of reasonable adjustment they are receiving.

The national data collection counts students who have been identified by a school team as receiving an adjustment to address a disability as defined under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (the DDA).

Slow down to 40 when bus lights flash

Tactical public awareness campaign

NSW has the largest metropolitan bus fleet in Australia. More than 3850 buses operate in the Sydney area, while another 1000 buses service the Newcastle, Wollongong, and Blue Mountains areas. In addition, in NSW there are thousands of buses that travel every day transporting students on country roads.

Crashes involving buses often result in more severe outcomes to other road users. This is because the size, mass and weight of buses mean they need more time to stop.

The Centre for Road Safety is committed to improving safety around buses. We are implementing a tactical school bus safety campaign comprising radio and social media which targets motorists and parents.



The issue

We are seeking to highlight for parents and carers the need to always supervise their children and hold their hand when walking to and from the bus stop or interchange and when crossing the road and about the need not to call their children across the road.

We are seeking to highlight for drivers the laws around bus flashing lights. Lights flash on the front and back of a bus when the bus is picking up or setting down school children. A 40km/h speed limit applies when bus lights flash.
